No, jungle survival in Guyana is for those that want to push themselves to their mental and physical limits in one of the planet's most beautiful, biodiverse—and perilous—environments.

Bushmasters has been offering jungle survival trips in Guyana since 2005. "We deliver hard adventure," says the company's founder Ian Craddock. "Physically hard and mentally hard."



If you take a jungle survival trip in Guyana, you can expect two weeks of sleeping in hammocks, carrying everything you need on your back, hunting down your dinner and cooking it on a fire you started without matches. 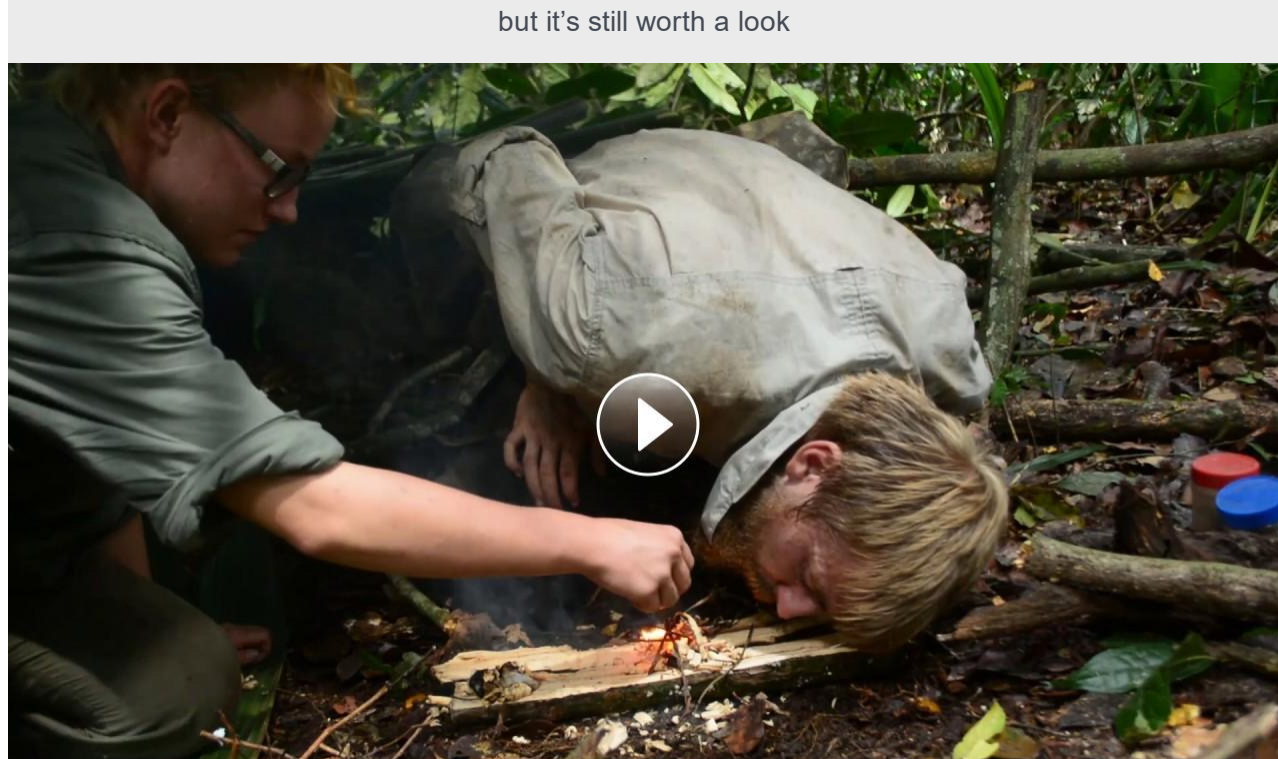
Every Bushmasters jungle survival trip is led by Ian & local guides, who are intimately familiar with the ways of the jungle.

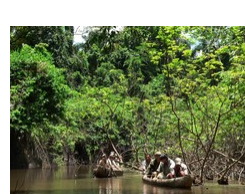
Jungle survival trips in Guyana are not for everyone, but if hard adventure is what you're looking for, look no further.

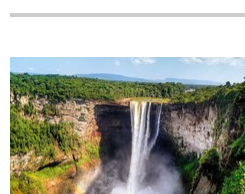

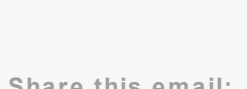
